






Old Abe often stole what from the regimental cook? Starting with Z, cross off every other letter to find out!

Money made from photographs, pamphlets, and feathers was used to help the sick and wounded soldiers. After


the war, Old Abe traveled to many fairs and soldiers' reunions in the east and Midwest.
